<p>Many children made positive comments about the video:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • I liked how some questions were answered in the video • The video was helpful • I liked the video so it could teach me lots about puberty • I felt uncomfortable writing about it but the video helped • I liked watching the video at home before watching it at school <p>There was only one negative comment about the video</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • It was minging having to watch the video <p>26% (9/35) commented positively on the "ask it basket" and being able to ask questions privately.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • I liked that you could ask questions privately and not just all out loud. <p>23% (8 /35) asked for more lessons but 12 children or 34% said they didn't want to learn more yet.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • I think we should do more lessons so I really understand! • I think I've learned a lot and I know most things so I don't want to learn more. • I don't want to learn anything else about puberty yet. • I think I know all the things about puberty suitable for Year 4. <p>14% (5/35) commented that it was helpful "getting out giggles" at the start.</p> <p>11% (4/35) commented that they think boys and girls should be taught separately.</p>					

In Conclusion:

- The 1Decision video was popular. All comments made were positive except one. The resources used supported the children's learning.
- It may be helpful to revisit the vocabulary taught
- Covid bubbles meant that girls and boys couldn't be taught separately this year but it is something to consider in subsequent years.
- Sending the parents the video on loom helped some families. Three parents contacted the school before lessons started. One to express gratitude that the subject was being covered as their child was showing signs of starting puberty. Two parents felt it was too early to cover puberty but after speaking with the class teachers both parents were supportive. 77% children reported discussing their learning with their families which is positive.
- One SEND child had a modified 1:1 session on puberty.
